The Caste System In Nepal Today

My topic is the caste system in Nepal today. First of all, I will describe the castes in Nepal. In ancient time, the King named "Mannu" divided the people into four castes; 1) Brahmin, 2) Kshatriya, 3) Vaishya, and 4) Sudra.

The Brahmin is known as a high class caste in the Hindu society. They work as priests in the society. The Kshatriya are warriors who fight for the country. Usually their occupation is to be solders of the government service. Vaishya is well known for doing business, like schools, hotels, and big companies.

The Sudra (dallit) are in the low class. People who work for the ones of the higher classes, such as, for the Brahmin, the Kshatriya, and the Vaishya. They work as labors, and seamstresses. The king made four castes to manage the society depending on the jobs. But later on, it turned into the caste discriminations. Slowly the high class people, the Brahmin, discriminated against



the lower class people, the Sudra, known as "dallit". Their discrimination for example, they don't drink water which is touched by the low class people.

Next, the situation of the caste discrimination in Nepal today. Caste discrimination remains in

the remote areas in Nepal. The Dallit are not allowed to enter the temple even when the statues are made by them. They cannot enter the priests' houses either. When they have a meal at the Brahmin's houses, they should wash the dishes themselves. And in the hotels, they have to wash their own. Gradually the situations are changing day by day, but due to the lack of education, the discrimination remains in remote villages in Nepal.

Now, we have a new constitution in Nepal. The constitution gives more

rights to the Dallit to improve their conditions. In every constitution board of the government, there's a reserved seat to help the Dallit to improve their economic status. And the education reservation in the public universities to educate them. In the new constitution, these are many rules to punish those who discriminate against the Dallit.

In conclusion, the conditions of the Dallit are being improved day by day. But in this 21st. century, its' not good to still have people suffering from the caste discrimination.

We should eliminate discrimination. We all are equal, our blood is red. Nobody in this world should be discriminated against because of the caste, color, sex, and religion.
